# A Public Policy Message from Branch Directory Lisa Taylor

Happy New Year, everyone! I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season with your families and you are ready to have another prosperous year supporting AAUW 's mission and goals.

I was appointed to serve as a director in the St. Louis Branch, and part of my role as a director is to share my comments in reference to Title IX in our newsletter. I gladly accepted the appointment, and learning and sharing Title IX information is a passion of mine.

I will start by **defining Title IX** to help us understand the meaning. Title IX can be defined as no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under <u>any education program</u> <u>or activity receiving federal financial assistance (Title</u> IX Education Amendments of 1972).

On June 23, 1972, President Richard Nixon signed into law Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; it is a very comprehensive law. A college or university that receives federal funds may be held legally responsible when it knows about and ignores sexual assault, sexual harassment, gender discrimination, and others forms of discrimination.

I just wanted to introduce you to the definition and some of the examples where Title IX can come into play on higher education campuses. I will share more in future newsletters; a topic about which I am very interested in learning more is how the current administration and the Secretary of Education, Betsy DeVos, will make changes to our current Title IX progression. Please share any questions and topics of interest, and I will gladly respond. Stay tuned.

Feb 13: Mistakes of the Past: Making Sense of the North

#### Korean Crisis

Daniel Pieper, Ph.D., East Asian Studies Department, Washington University in St. Louis. Dr. Pieper is a lecturer at Washington University whose research focuses on the cultural history of modern Korea. He spent seven years living in South Korea, most recently as a Fulbright Junior Researcher in Seoul from 2016-2017 where he witnessed the massive peaceful protest that removed the right-wing Korean president Park Geunhye from power. Dr. Pieper will present a brief history of how thoughtless geopolitical division by superpowers resulted in war, ideological dictatorships, and now the surreal juxtaposition of a hyper-modern model democracy and the last Stalinist state on earth. Dr. Pieper will also discuss issues of North and South Korean identity and the disparate perceptions of the North Korean crisis in the United States and in South Korea. Coordinator: Kayla Vaughan
