Public Policy Update by Lisa Taylor

The Chronicle of Higher Education had a very lengthy article in their January 26, 2018, publication titled *Making Sexual Assault Hearings Fair: How colleges Train and Choose Those Who Serve on Title XI Panels Is Changing.*

As we read and share information from the article, there are a couple of things we should keep in mind. Remember,

- The University of Virginia is a "flagship" university
- Laws, policies, and procedures vary from state to state, and
- Financial resources for colleges are very challenging at this time.

There was a four-year investigation of the University of Virginia because they failed to resolve sexual assault complaints "promptly and equitably," according to the U.S. Department of Education for Civil Rights, which was the basis for a "hostile environment." Therefore, they had violated the gender equity law also known as Title IX. Other issues involved were the solicited panelists for the disciplinary process which gave the appearance of a conflict of interest and the panelists did not have proper training on how to understand forensic or medical evidence, such as rape kits, drug or alcohol tests.


As a resolution agreement, the University agreed to change their sexual assault policies. There were changes made as to who would serve as panelists, and their responsibilities were more defined.

The main points of consideration when selecting a panel are: willingness to serve, lack of bias, good bedside manner, confidentiality, and diversity. Having a diverse panel is crucial because it is probably the most obvious to victims of sexual assault and will give them an impression of having a fair and equitable hearing and not the expected "faculty representation."

Colleges cannot overlook the important and lasting work of sexual assault hearing panelists and the service they provide to the campus community. Colleges have an obligation to find and train the right people, and the right people will have a fair and effective panel.



AAUW National Conference for College Women Student Leaders



May 30-June 2, 2018 • University of Maryland, College Park

NCCWSL is the place for women students to harness their leadership potential and view the world through new perspectives. They will leave with the tools needed to propel their career forward and drive change on their campus or in their community.

Thanks to the efforts of **Deb McWard**, AAUW Missouri college-university liaison, the St. Louis Interbranch Council (IBC) has sent students of area college and university members to NCCWSL for the past several years. Six (now five) branches and generous individual members pool funds to pay for registration and air fare, plus extra funds to cover ground transportation and off-campus meals.

The students who were selected to attend the conference this coming May are

- Taylor Michl, a junior at Webster University. Her majors are Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies and Spanish. She is an undergraduate research assistant in the Psychology Department investigating the career development of psychologists working in oncology. She was chosen as one of ten student liaisons on the Student Conduct and Sexual Offense Hearing Boards. She also has been the development intern at Doorways, a nonprofit residential center for HIV+ people in poverty in Missouri and Illinois.
- Shima Rostami, a graduate student at Lindenwood University. She is working on her doctorate in education. She earned a B.S. in Islamic Jurisprudence and Law from Imam Sadiq University, Tehran, and an M.S. in Criminal Justice and Law Enforcement, Lindenwood (Belleville, IL). Shima is completing a research project that raises awareness of human trafficking on college campuses. She is willing to be the AAUW liaison at Lindenwood University. For the

past two years, Shima has been the part-time program director for the St. Charles Coalition Against Human Trafficking (SCCAT) and has been the driving force behind three conferences open to the public. Under her leadership, SCCAT put together the first teach training for Ft. Zumwalt School District (St. Peters, MO); represented MO at a regional conference by the Office of Violence Against Women in Kentucky; and has made connections with law enforcement officers, Homeland Security, U.S. Immigration and Customs agents, whom she often includes in presentations. She also is a members of AAUW Ballwin-Chesterfield.
