 As part of our ongoing public policy work on closing the gender pay gap, Ellen Irons, president of AAUW St. Louis Branch, will pre sent a 90-minute program that will cover the most recent facts

about the pay gap and will have some negotiations skills hands-on activities. It is a free event, and all are welcome.

This program came about because **Zach Fletcher**, the adult services provider at Schlafly Library, reached out to us. In his email, he said, "Schlafly is in the process of planning some special programming for Women's History Month in March, and we're looking for local organizations who might be interested in partnering with us. I know that AAUW is already doing some Work Smart programs with the St. Louis County Library, so I thought you'd be a good group to reach out to." January 14: Organized Voter Suppression Tactics: An International Perspective

Denise Lieberman, J.D., is director of the Power and Democracy Program at Advancement Project, a civil rights organization based in Washington, D.C. A seasoned constitutional and civil rights lawyer for more than 20 years, Lieberman has been at the forefront of voting rights actions in Missouri and across the country. She is also an adjunct professor with Washington University School of Law, lecturing on the international aspects of election issues, as well as other subjects. <u>February 11</u>: Triple Threat of Global Warming: Ecological, Environmental, and Humanitarian Crises

Dr. Thomas E. Lovejoy coined the term "biological diversity" and played a central role in the establishment of conservation biology as a science. He helped establish and, since the 1970s, has headed a large-scale experiment to study the effects of deforestation on the diversity of animal and plant species in the Amazon. This work has guided the planning of conservation areas in the region. Lovejoy has advised three U.S. presidents on climate change. From 1987 to 1998 he served as an assistant secretary for the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. From 1999 to 2002, he served as chief biodiversity adviser to the president of the World Bank. Joseph Scherrer is Washington University in St. Louis' executive director of the Henry Edwin Sever Institute, director of the Cybersecurity Strategic Initiative, and program director of graduate studies in Information Systems Management & Cybersecurity Management. Following a distinguished 24-year career as a leader and IT and cybersecurity innovator with the U.S. Air Force, culminating as the commander of the Air Force's only combat-coded deployable communications wing, Scherrer retired as a colonel.

Leiter joined the Department of Political Science at the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 2013. She received her B.A. from the University of California-San Diego and her Ph.D. from the University of California-Davis. She is an award-winning researcher and teacher, having received the Carrie Chapman Catt Prize on Women and Politics and the UMKC CAS Alumni Outstanding Teaching Award.

PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW MO is now involved with gathering signatures to place <u>Medicaid Expansion</u> on the 2020 ballot as a resolution. As stated in AAUW's 2019–21 Public Policies Priorities, "We support robust and strong Medicare and Medicaid systems and oppose any efforts to undermine them." If you have not yet signed the petition, let Karen Francis (Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch) know.

We recently honored our veterans on Veteran's Day. Did you know that one in ten veterans is a woman? Back in 2012 the film The Invisible War was released. It showed the efforts that were underway to address and prevent sexual violence in the military. One initiative was to use the justice system to change the legal precedent that deemed rape as an occupational hazard. AAUW, through our case support program, supported the veterans in three lawsuits against the Department of Defense. Every two years the Department of Defense compiles a report on military sexual assaults. In the recent 2018 report, 13,000 active duty women across the military reported they were sexually assaulted in 2018. That is a four-year high. As a reminder, Violence Against Women and Closing the Gender Pay Gap are the highest priorities of AAUW's Public Policy Programs.

New Pay Gap Facts

Earlier this month, AAUW released some updated highlights of our signature report The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap. The analysis indicates that women do not make less money simply because they choose different careers than men or decide to become mothers. Rather, the undervaluing of women's work, implicit bias against working mothers and direct race and gender bias diminish women's salaries.
