


Despite civil rights laws and advancements in women's economic status, workplace discrimination still persists. As AAUW's report <u>The Simple Truth about the Gender</u> <u>Pay Gap</u> explains, the latest numbers from the U.S. Census Bureau once again revealed that women working full-time, year-round are on average paid only 83 cents for every dollar paid to men. **But there is some good news.** There are gains in awareness and individual success stories, and some advancements have been occurring at the local level.

Come hear a panel presentation on:

- Updates on the status of gender pay equity, the national *Paycheck Fairness Act*, bans on asking salary history questions nation-wide, and the current focus of AAUW MO public policy and pay equity advocacy. *Presented by Ellen Irons*
- Updates and progress in the City of St. Louis – passage of ORDINANCE 71095 regarding salary history questions during interviews, changes in the city's personnel department and transparency, and planned action for AAUW St. Louis to meet with Mayor Jones on gender pay equity issues. *Presented by Kathleen Farrell and Jan Scott*

in other professions, women are under-represented and undervalued in the art world. Only a third of artists represented by commercial galleries are women, and women working in arts professions are paid on average 74 cents to every dollar paid to men. This is what motivates AAUW to host an annual art contest—to give women artists the attention they deserve.

We want to warmly congratulate Susan Barley as the St. Louis Branch's 2022 Barbara Lackritz Honoree!! Sue has been an



AAUW member for over 41 years, joining the Creve Coeur Branch in 1971 (a charter member), Chesterfield Branch in 1984, Greater Naples (FL) in 2001, and the St. Louis Branch in 2010. She became a lifetime member in 1999 and a Legacy Circle member in 2011. She currently belongs to three branches (Ballwin-Chesterfield, St. Louis, and Greater Naples, FL), volunteering for positions in all branches.

Sue has served extensively on national, state, and branch boards and committees, including the national Committee Appointments Task Force chair, 2017 National Convention Committee, 125th Year Anniversary founding leader in 2007, National Legacy Circle team, Leadership Corp, Fundraising Committee); state committee leadership of bylaws chair, Educational Foundation chair, introduced the Eleanor Roosevelt Walk in 2001, developed the Century Club award system, governance co-chair); and branch committees for the Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch (newsletter editor, bylaws chair, Educational Foundation chair, directory chair) and the St. Louis Branch (bylaws chair, AAUW Fund chair).

St. Louis Launches Branch Project to Join in the "AAUW MO - Votes-For-Women Trail" Initiative

On January 14 eight St. Louis Branch members met on Zoom to launch our own project as part of the "AAUW MO Votes-for-Women Trail" initiative. This state-wide project, with Pat Shores as state coordinator, has the goal of continuing the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment by guiding branches to find and collectively post new sites to the National Votes for Women Trail (<u>https://ncwhs.org/votes-forwomen-trail/</u>).

Our branch is very enthusiastic in finding names of lessrecognized women in the St. Louis area and has already identified three women we will be researching. These women are all in the Beyond the Ballot exhibit, but not yet on the Trail:

Cynthelia Isrig Knefler. Reasons: Connection with labor, Womens' Trade Union League; she fought racism in the movement and supported Victoria Clay Haley to attend a suffrage conference held at a hotel when Victoria was being turned away because she was a black woman.

Victoria Clay Haley. Reasons: Leader in black women's suffrage movement, president of the Federated Colored Women's Clubs of St. Louis.

Rosa Sonnenschein. Reasons: Created and wrote for the *American Jewess*, advocating for the expansion of women's roles in the synagogue and the Jewish community; supported women's suffrage while advancing women in parallel activities.

We are just getting started, so we are likely to uncover even more women along the way!

Carl M. Bender is the Konneker Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Physics at Washington University

The Waxing and Waning of Democracy Around the World



Speaker: Olga Bezhanova, PhD

Olga Bezhanova is an associate professor of Spanish Literature and chair of the Dept. of Foreign Languages and Literature at Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville. Her book, *Growing Up in an Inhospitable World: Female Bildungsroman in Spain,* was awarded the Victoria Urbano Prize for the Best Critical Monograph.

After the fall of the USSR in 1991 and the subsequent efforts of countries in Eastern Europe and the Global South to establish democratic regimes, there was a widespread feeling that humanity had achieved what Francis Fukuyama termed "the end of history" and accepted the primacy of representative democracy over other types of political systems. Since then, however, we have seen the initial enthusiasm for democracy weaken in Latin America and countries of Central and Eastern Europe. At the same time, well-established democracies of the West have experienced a series of crises that cast doubt over their capacity to preserve fully democratic systems of government. What is the future of democracy? Will it renew itself in the coming years or are we to prepare for continued weakening of democratic institutions everywhere? Coordinator: Sharon Poe

Christopher Lewis, MD, is co-director of Pediatric Transgender Health, director of Differences of Sex Development Clinic, and assistant professor of pediatric (continued on page 9) endocrinology in the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis.

Samati Nioymchai is an HIV/AIDS case manager at Washington University. He is a licensed master social worker with more than four years' experience in case management, working with low-income populations in both emergency medicine and clinic settings, and providing intervention services for individuals experiencing domestic violence. In 2014 he was a contributor to the groundbreaking anthology *Recognize: The Voices of Bisexual Men*.

Rabbi Daniel Bogard is a co-rabbi at Central Reform Congregation--a position he shares with his spouse, Karen. A lifelong social justice advocate, he is involved in numerous causes, including advocating for undocumented persons in St. Louis and working to make the minimum wage a living wage in Missouri. He will share his personal story of advocating before the Missouri legislature on behalf of one of the couple's three young children who is transgender.

Immigration has been a touchstone of the U.S. political debate for decades, as policymakers have weighed economic, security, and humanitarian concerns. Congress has been unable to reach an agreement on comprehensive immigration reform for years, and in the meantime, people are suffering. NCJWSTL has always been at the forefront of immigration rights advocacy, but we must always strive to do more.

AAUW Missouri is shifting the focus of the equal pay advocates from communicating with Missouri state leg-



islators to meeting with local city officials about the gender pay gap. Ellen Irons and Jan Scott have volunteered to make the approach to City of St. Louis' Mayor Jones.

The Equal Pay Advocates are making the change because most members of the Missouri Senate and House of Representatives have not been receptive to discussing the gender pay gap nor bringing bills to the floor. Five bills were filed last year; some were assigned to a committee, but none had a hearing. As the registered AAUW of MO lobbyist, I will continue to monitor the equal pay bills in the next session.

AAUW members established a personal relationship with local officials in 2020–2021 when we asked them to support proclamations for the 100th anniversary of women getting the vote. We want to build on that relationship with Equal Pay Advocate meetings. Information in support of equal pay for equal work for the women who work in their cities will be shared. We will also help them see that AAUW is a trusted source of information about the gender pay gap.

Sex Discrimination Today Takes a Variety of Forms

GENDER

Unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 can affect both women and men.

AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change. LAF was created in 1981 by AAUW members and has provided millions of dollars to balance the scales of justice for people working toward gender equity through the legal system. We support brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress for equal pay, Title IX, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and tenure denial violations. We allocate \$100,000 annually to help fund landmark cases, such as *Wal-Mart v. Dukes* and *Cioca v. Rumsfeld*, as well was cases with the potential to set future precedents like *Rizo v. Fresno County Office of Education*.

National Equal Pay Day

Everyone knows that it's the 21st century! Isn't it time that modern humans finally set this women-aren't-paid -equally nonsense behind them and just give equal pay for equal work? That's what National Equal Pay Day is all about.

Throughout the last century, there has been an ongoing and active fight to solve a problem that has existed far longer than that. Ever since history and work began, women have been paid lower wages for doing the exact same job. And the gap gets even wider when women of color are considered in comparison to white men.

National Equal Pay Day encourages people to get out there and fight for true employment equality for every-

one, no matter their gender or the color of their skin! Isn't it time people were paid what they are worth?

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, March 15, 2022. This date symbolizes how



far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year.
