### St. Louis Branch Achieves 90% Giving Participation

## AAUW Members Met with Dana Tiger April 15 at the Residence Inn Galleria

During our March St. Louis Branch Movie Club discussion of the movie "Wind River," Laura X mentioned that she knew Dana Tiger, a Creek/Seminole and Cherokee artist who lives in Muskogee, Oklahoma. Amazingly, this led to an in-person event on April 15 at the Galleria Residence Inn. A number of St. Louis

and Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch members attended and greatly enjoyed viewing Dana's art and talking to her informally. Dana was able to attend the annual pow-wow held at Washington University on April 16.

In addition to being an amazing artist, Dana has worked extensively on the issue of missing and murdered indigenous women. In fact, she has created both print and wearable art especially on this topic and has been part of a circle of motorcycle riders raising money for the cause.

After the event, Dana informed us that she was very grateful to AAUW for attending and that, of the \$500 dollars she raised on the sale of her work, she donated \$250 to Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW). In Dana's words, "The morning of our gathering In St Louis, I called the woman at the helm of the Oklahoma MMIW chapter, and she talked to me about the work. I would like to share here and ask that you pass on her words to those who came. Her name is Charisse Red Bone. Her daughter's name is Rochelle. Together, their heart is bigger than the planet in what they

do for families who've lost loved ones. Here's some of what Charisse shared:

### SELF EDUCATE

- ~ Don't depend on other's opinion
- ~ Awareness is perpetual
- ~ 1 in 10 come up missing
- ~ Share missing person ID#, police badge#, phone#
- ~ Our mouths = COMMUNICATION
- ~ Reach out to media
- ~ Get permission to help the family



Reckoning with Enslavement's Legacy: Moral Responses

The Society of Jesus, or Jesuits, like many religious orders, held people in slavery from the colonial era until the abolition of slavery in 1865. The enslaved helped establish and sustain Jesuit educational institutions across the United States, including Saint Louis University and the former St. Stanislaus Seminary in Florissant.

In 2016 the Jesuit Central and Southern Province and St. Louis University began the Slavery, History, Memory and Reconciliation research project, with the goal of restoring the humanity of the enslaved through their legacies. Using sacramental records and genealogy, the researchers have identified about 70 people the Jesuits enslaved in the St. Louis

region between 1823 and 1865, and they have been working to locate and connect with those descendants.

Thousands of other descendants live in the United States today. The value of what has been taken from them is incalculable, and slavery led to racial inequities throughout St. Louis and the country. Is it enough to simply acknowledge the facts and wait for reconciliation to occur? Our speaker will explore that question as he focuses on slavery's aftermath in St. Louis and responses to honor those who were enslaved.

Speaker: **Rev. Jeffrey Harrison**, SJ, a St. Louis native, is currently the project coordinator for the Slavery, History, Memory, and Reconciliation project, having been a project researcher between 2017-2020.

The 2022 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) will once again be entirely virtual. The workshops, panels, speakers and activities provide endless

opportunities to learn from experts, while peer networking allows attendees to learn from one another and make lifelong connections. We are excited to offer this opportunity for safe, easy access to learning and networking for all.



AAUW believes NCCWSL provides valuable opportunities for students from all backgrounds, and each year awards scholarships to the conference.

AAUW St. Louis is part of the IBC effort to send women student leaders to the NCCWSL leadership conference and always sends money to IBC for an IBC attendee. Before Covid, the registration fee and airfare are covered for the student, who is selected from applicants of AAUW member institutions. Recently, students unfortunately had to attend virtually, and this year is no different.

Natalie Scheers, a directing major at Sargent Conservatory of Theatre Arts at Webster University, was nominated by Webster for the IBC scholarship and accepted by IBC. Her registration fee has been paid to NCCWSL. Natalie said she wants "to build and create inclusive theaters around the country, and further if I am able to have resources to do so. In further detail, I will produce and direct shows of high quality utilizing Actors' Equity Association (AEA) adults, local adults, kids, and teens, but most importantly kids and teens of varying ability all throughout the cast and crew. I have worked with Variety the Children's Charity that had, at one point, created something like this, and it was the most impactful atmosphere I have ever been a part of. Watching the Variety kids and teens grow up and learn so many skills, not only in the arts, but ones that they can take into their daily lives, was something that I will forever cherish and has inspired me to continue this legacy. "

Nikole Hannah-Jones, Pulitzer-Prizewinning creator of "The 1619 Project" and a staff writer at *The New York Times Magazine*, will keynote the 2022 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) in May.

reframed American history by putting the consequences of slavery at the center of our national narrative. She spent her career investigating racial inequality and injustice, and her reporting has earned her the MacArthur Fellowship, a Peabody Award, two George Polk Awards and the National Magazine Award three times.

## LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

### Complainant, The University of Colorado Boulder

A sexual assault student victim at the University of Colorado Boulder reported under Title IX to the University, where her case was considered under one of the new tribunals created by damaging Title IX regulations that went into effect in August 2020. The student's attorney navigated her rights in the investigative and disciplinary process, which involved significant procedural irregularities and inequities creating barriers to the exercise of her rights under Title IX.

### Sharif v. Regents of University of California

Rana Sharif, a Palestinian-American educator, researcher, feminist, and community advocate, was a Ph.D. student at the University of California, Los Angeles. After having two children during graduate school, including one with health issues, Sharif was abruptly and arbitrarily disqualified from her doctoral program without notice, and within months of completing her dissertation – allegedly for exceeding her department's recommended "time to degree."

### Joseph v. Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia et al

MaChelle Joseph is the former Head Coach of the Georgia Institute of Technology's women's basketball team, which she successfully led for 16 years. The university's athletic department, however, afforded Coach Joseph and her team significantly fewer benefits and resources than it provided to the men's basketball team. Soon after Coach Joseph filed a complaint about this discriminatory treatment, the university suspended and ultimately terminated her employment.

### Paige v. USAID

Three women, each of whom worked for USAID for more than 27 years in overseas posts, achieved the highest rank in the Senior Foreign Service (Career Minister). But in 2016, each discovered that, despite their greater seniority and higher rank, they were paid considerably less than dozens of lower ranking and less experienced male Senior Foreign Service officers.
