Plans for the 2024–25 AAUW MO May state meeting have begun for Saturday, May 3, 2025, via Zoom. Please mark your calendars for this morning event. AAUW MO is alternating its state meetings with in-person meetings in even-numbered years and Zoom meetings in the odd-numbered years.

The May 2025 meeting will include a state business meeting, elections, state awards, a presentation by an AAUW national leader, and a keynote presentation on AAUW MO vital issues. Full details will be in the winter edition of *Missouri in Motion*.

From Branch Member Sally McGowan's presentation at Girl Scouts of Eastern Missouri Women's History Month Patch Program. The pillar is Entrepreneurship/Outdoors: Sally McGowan, outdoor enthusiast and entrepreneur.

Professor Wangori Maathi

In honor of Women's History Month, I would like to share research that I did on a special Women of the Outdoors and the Environment that is being presented to the Eastern Missouri Girl Scouts. Professor Wangari Maathai was born in Kenya in 1940 and died in 2011. Her role in life was to improve the environment, teach, provide a fuel source, and alleviate poverty. She was an environmental activist as well as an advocate for women's rights, human rights and aids. Other titles that she carried was Member of Kenya's National Assembly, Assistant Minister of the Environment, Natural Resources, & Wildlife. She was mostly known for being the first woman in Africa woman to receive a Noble Peace Prize in 2004.

She was well-rounded due to schooling in the U.S. (mid-west) and in Africa. When she returned to her home land, she noticed something different from the rich, lush, green, and fertile land that she once knew. She saw land-slides, rivers rushing down the hillside, soil eroding with silt, cows were skinnier, clean drinking water was scarce, and people looked under nourished. Farmers had changed from growing crops of food to cash crops like tea & coffee. Women were feeding their families processed foods as a result. Forests were cleared of trees to grow these crops. So, no wood for fuel, nor for fencing, no food for livestock and no clean drinking water. At 37 yrs old, Wangari founded the Green Belt Movement.



She was met with lots of obstacles. She was jailed twice, divorced, lost jobs, lost seed money, and constantly questioned by her male students. Her own husband divorced her because she had a higher education (first African Woman to receive a doctorate degree) and that was frowned upon by his peers. Maathai was outspoken which constituted stepping far outside traditional female gender roles. Yet she persisted. With her knowledge of biology, politics and familiarity of the land, she figured a way to plant trees to help the environment and help the women of Africa. This was during the Women's Movement of the 1970's. Maathai taught groups of women that were already planting and harvesting other crops while raising children in the field to provide an income for themselves and their families. She provided an income to over 900,000 women by planting more than 30 million trees. The Green Belt Movement was ultimately responsible for planting 11 billion trees around the world! Thank you Wangari Maathai!

March 11, 2025 Modern Geopolitics: The Ghost of Sir John Mackinder

Kevin Jon Fernlund, Ph.D.

Kevin Jon Fernlund is a Professor of History at the University of Missouri - St. Louis and is the author of Lyndon B. Johnson and Modern America (2009) and William Henry Holmes and the Rediscovery of the American West (2000). From 2001 to 2002, he was a Fulbright Scholar in Vietnam and between 2006 and 2012, he directed the Western History Association. His most recent book is A Big History of North America, from Montezuma to Monroe (2023).

Dr. Fernlund's presentation is "Donald Trump, America First, and the Ghost of Sir Halford John Mackinder, the Father of Modern Geopolitics," an evaluation of US foreign policy in the second Trump Administration.



Mackinder is often credited with introducing two new terms into the English language: "manpower" and "heartland." The Heartland Theory and more generally classical geopolitics and geostrategy were extremely influential in the making of US strategic policy during the period of the Cold War. Dr. Fernlund spoke earlier this year of how geography shapes global politics, echoing Paul Kennedy's insights on "how distance and terrain and climate affect the affairs of states and men."

April 8, 2025 Food Insecurity: Hunger and Famine Now, and in the Near Future Patricia Wolff, M.D.



Pediatrician Patricia Wolff founded the U.S. non-profit *Meds & Food for Kids (MFK)* in 2003 and served as Executive Director until 2020. Since its inception, MFK has saved the lives of almost 1,000,000 children seen in over 50 clinics in Haiti and with Haitian-made Ready to Use Therapeutic Food exported to 17

countries. The MFK approach is to use local labor and local resources to manufacture Medika Mamba, a treatment for malnutrition, which in turn develops the local economy.

For many years, Dr. Wolff spent half her time in Haiti to develop *Meds & Food for Kids*. She is a pediatrician, endocrinologist, and served as President of Forest Park

Pediatrics. Dr. Wolff's many awards include the St. Louis Women of Achievement (May 2017) and the St. Louis Bar Foundation Humanitarian Award (October 2015).
