Bridget Laramie Kelly, PhD candidate in History and an **AAUW American Fellow at Washington University**, will be our speaker on Thursday, February 19th. Bridget is a social and urban historian of the United States whose work examines Black freedom struggles, gender, and governance. She is the author of *I Get So Mad Cause We Ain't Got No Freedom: Black Women, Rage, and the Harlem Uprising of 1943* and *The Materiality of Belonging: Black Property Claims*

after the Civil War. Her writing includes a piece for *The Metropole* titled *Annexation Politics & Manufacturing Blight in a Black St. Louis Suburb*, a historical essay about Meacham Park. In that essay she explores how annexation and the designation of "blight" were used to justify absorbing Meacham Park into Kirkwood.

With that, **Christine Nobbe** knew that St. Louis AAUW members must begin working to bring to fruition their “Women Making Their Mark” project presented in collaboration with the **St. Louis Montessori Adolescent Program (MAP)**.

The **March 30 – April 27, 2026** program will take place at the MAP school. As reported in the January 2026 newsletter, it will include two women scientists whose work features microscopy images, one woman scientist who creates biological models, and a woman artist whose work is based on STEM. The women will present at the MAP All-School Council Meeting, conduct workshops for students, and speak at the opening of the public exhibition of their work in MAP’s Gallery on Friday, April 3, 2026.



The presenters will reach all MAP faculty members and students, AAUW members of the St. Louis area branches, Girl Scouts of Eastern Missouri, businesses, museums, and makers’ art facilities in the Grand Art District where MAP is located, and art faculty and students at St. Louis colleges and universities.



Upcoming selections:

Feb 26 *Heartland: A Memoir of Working Hard and Being Broke in the Richest Country on Earth*, by Sarah Smarsh, 304 pages, 9-18-2018. Patty Murray, facilitator.

Sarah Smarsh was born a fifth generation Kansas wheat farmer on her paternal side, and the product of generations of teen mothers on her maternal side. Through her experiences growing up on a farm thirty miles west of Wichita, we are given a unique and essential look into the lives of poor and working-class Americans living in the heartland. During Sarah's turbulent childhood in Kansas in the 1980s and 1990s, she enjoyed the freedom of a country childhood but observed the painful challenges of the poverty around her; untreated medical conditions for lack of insurance or consistent care, unsafe job conditions, abusive relationships, and limited resources and information that would provide for the upward mobility that is the

American Dream. By telling the story of her life and the lives of the people she loves with clarity and precision but without judgement, Smarsh challenges us to look more closely at the class divide in our country. Beautifully written, in a distinctive voice, Heartland combines personal narrative with powerful analysis and cultural commentary, challenging the myths about people thought to be less because they earn less.

Mar 26 *Sula*, by Toni Morrison, 192 pages, 1973. Nancy Hutchins, facilitator.

Sula and Nel are two young black girls: clever and poor. They grow up together sharing their secrets, dreams and happiness. Then Sula breaks free from their small-town community in the uplands of Ohio to roam the cities of America. When she returns ten years later much has changed. Including Nel, who now has a husband and three children. The friendship between the two women becomes strained and the whole town grows wary as Sula continues in her wayward, vagabond and uncompromising ways.

Apr 23 *My Friends*, by Fredrik Backman, 448 pages, May 6, 2025. Jayne Kasten, facilitator.

Most people don't even notice them—three tiny figures sitting at the end of a long pier in the corner of one of the most famous paintings in the world. Most people think it's just a depiction of the sea. But Louisa, an aspiring artist herself, knows otherwise, and she is determined to find out the story of these three enigmatic figures. Louisa is proof that happy endings don't always take the form we expect in this stunning testament to the transformative, timeless power of friendship and art.

May 28 *Anna: The Biography*, by Amy Odell, 464 pages, May 3, 2022, Teri Brecht, facilitator.

Named one of *Time's* 100 Must-Read Books of 2022, this in-depth and revealing biography is based on extensive interviews with Anna Wintour's closest friends and collaborators. Weaving Anna's personal story into a larger narrative about the hierarchical dynamics of the fashion industry and the complex world of Condé Nast, Anna charts the relentless ambition of the woman who would become an icon.

June 25 *By Any Other Name*, by Jodi Picoult, 544 pages, August 20, 2024, Kay Myer or another group member, facilitator.

***How Tariffs Reshape Global Supply
Chains and How to Navigate***

Haitao Li, Ph.D., professor and chair of the Department of Supply Chain and Analytics and director of Laboratory of Advanced Supply Chain Analytics (LASCA), University of Missouri – St. Louis

Rising tariffs have been reshaping global supply chains. In this talk, I will first summarize such evidence across key industries, including manufacturing, food & agriculture, healthcare and medical products, and consumer goods. I will then share my perspectives on strategies for businesses to navigate through, with economic sustainability and competitiveness.

People Not Politicians (PNP) with which AAUW-MO has partnered is watching numerous lawsuits move through the Missouri courts. Most importantly, expedited oral arguments for *Luther vs Hoskins* challenging the constitutionality of mid-decade redistricting passed by the Missouri legislature and signed by Governor Kehoe in September of 2025 will be heard at the Missouri Supreme Court on Tuesday, March 10, 2026, in Jefferson City.
